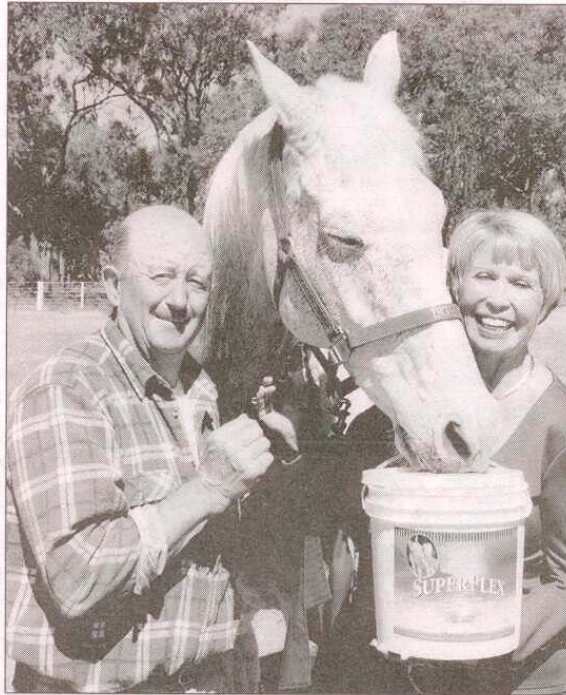
Once Graham managed to locate Pattie, from Sacramento, the deadlock was broken almost immediately.
